**NOTICE OF EXEMPTION**

- 1. APPLICANT: Alpine County Community Development Department

Access Road Culvert /Crossing Repair Emergency Project
- 6. DESCRIPTION: Severe winter storms, high winds, flooding and mudslides caused widespread damage throughout the state of California, impacting many counties during the incident period. The Applicant experienced losses in the County of Alpine due to this presidentially declared event (DR-4308-CA), including the complete loss of a galvanized corrugated metal culvert crossing and the 12-foot wide by 30 foot long rock-surfaced roadway crossing. The crossing (UTM 38.69498; 119.778398) is over an active waterway, Millberry Creek, and is the sole access to Markleeville community's wastewater treatment facility. The road is referred to as the Markleeville Public Utility District (MPUD) Road.

The Project will repair the existing access road crossing by replacing the galvanized corrugated metal culvert that was lost during event DR-4308-CA with a 8 foot by 4 foot RCB Arch with headwalls/wingwalls. The bedload materials of Millberry Creek will be salvaged and reused in the design.

**ADMINISTRATIVE DETERMINATION:** The Planning Department has completed a preliminary review of this project in accordance with Alpine County adopted guidelines for implementing the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) of 1970. Based on that review, the Environmental Administrator finds that the proposed project constitutes a Categorical Exemption. Therefore, the Environmental Administrator has determined that further environmental evaluation is not required because:

The project is classified as an Emergency Project (CEQA Guidelines § 15269a): a) Projects to maintain, repair, restore, demolish, or replace property or facilities damaged or destroyed as a result of a disaster in a disaster stricken area in which a state of emergency has been proclaimed by the Governor pursuant to the California Emergency Services Act, commencing with Section 8550 of the Government Code.
